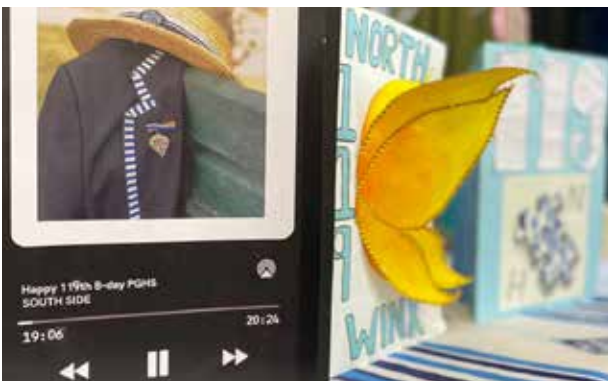

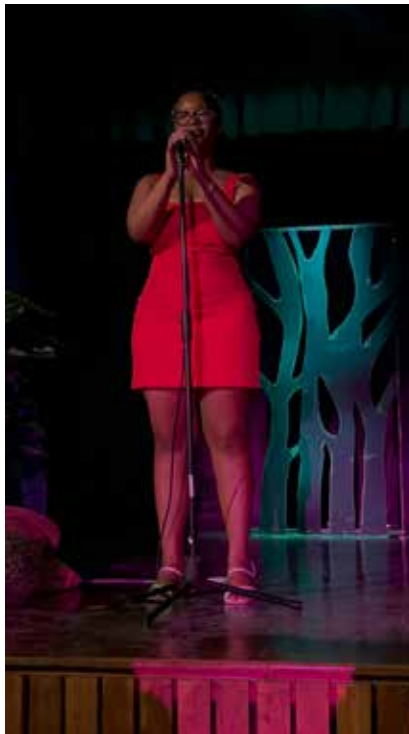
It is not yet over.

Lastly, I extend a heartfelt greeting to the members of our **School Governing Body**, our dedicated **educators, administrative and support staff, learners, and, most importantly, our Matric Class of 2024**.

It is truly a pleasure and an honour to stand before you today at this momentous event in the calendar of The High School for Girls, Potchefstroom - the annual Prize Giving Ceremony. This gathering holds a special place in our hearts as we come together to **acknowledge and celebrate the remarkable achievements and accomplishments of our girls**.

As I stand before you now, I want to remind you of our theme for 2024: ***In Unity is Strength***.

We were admittedly inspired to make this selection by the 2023 World Cup Springbok Rugby Team - a group that epitomized the spirit of unity. Their diverse squad, with players from various backgrounds and cultures, came together under the banner ***"Together in One Nation, One Team"***, and as such imprinted



upon every South African that our strength lies in our unity.

In a world often fraught with division, we discovered power in our shared vision and our diversity.

Unity is the thread that weaves our strengths together, amplifying the power of our shared purpose. Throughout 2024, this theme has served as a reminder that it is through our togetherness that we overcome obstacles, deepen our understanding, and prepare ourselves for the world beyond these walls.

Education has always been at the **heart of our mission** - particularly the **education of girls**. It is not merely about learning subjects and passing exams; education is the **key to empowerment**. It ignites the potential within each of the girls in attendance at our school, opening doors not just for themselves but for those who will follow in their footsteps.

My vision has always been to create a space where our **girls feel empowered**, where their **voices are heard**, and where they are equipped to face tomorrow's challenges with confidence and strength.

Collectively, we all firmly believe that our purpose is to **prepare young women** who, upon leaving our gates, will go forth to make a **significant impact in the world**. This commitment is reflected in our integration of the pillars of Academics, Sport, Culture, and Service.

As a School of Excellence, our priority is to ensure that every learner receives a **high-quality education** that fosters growth and achievement according to, or even exceeding, her potential.

In January this year, we were thrilled to announce that the class of **2023** achieved remarkable results, boasting **(once again)** a **100% pass rate**. An impressive **97, 8%** of our girls qualified to **study** at Tertiary level. Among the **92 Matrics**, **15** candidates achieved an average of **80% or higher**, and the class amassed a total of **180 distinctions** and an overall **grade average** of **70, 2%**.

Just as an aside, **Class of 2024** – no pressure, but we certainly have **high aspirations** for your success! We not only expect a **100% pass rate**, but also wholeheartedly hope for a bachelor pass of **95% or more**, as you promised in your pledge.

Ladies and gentlemen, it is important to emphasise that outstanding results were not achieved by our matric learners alone, but by the **collective effort of the entire school**. What has been particularly noteworthy throughout this year is the evident improvement in the performance average of each grade as the year progressed. This remains a testament to our school motto:

“Resevera Verum Gaudium!”

While **academic performance and curriculum coverage** will always be our top priority, the **co-curricular programme** at The High School for Girls, Potchefstroom is **equally vital** in our commitment to developing well-rounded individuals, for it fosters **teamwork, discipline**, and a sense of **camaraderie** amongst our girls.

Each week, our *Communique* has highlighted the active involvement and noteworthy achievements of our learners and in turn reflected the impressive and eventful nature of this year's programme.

Under the efficient and enthusiastic management of our **Co-Curricular Coordinator, Mrs Kemp**, we have witnessed significant **growth** and **countless enriching experiences**. We commend her as well as many of our educators and **outside coaches** for their tireless efforts in organising these opportunities, which have encompassed a diverse range of inter-house events, sports activities, and cultural pursuits - all contributing to a **vibrant school environment** and invaluable **personal development**.

This year, our **inter-house events were a cornerstone of learner engagement and communal spirit**. Highlights included the Inter-House Gala, Inter-House Athletics, Derby Week, the House Play Festival and the General Knowledge quizzes at the end of each term. These events all contribute to the accumulation of **house points** as **Adventure, Discovery, and Quest vie for the prestigious Cock House Trophy**.

Our participation in various festivals further enriched our learners' experiences. The High School for Girls **proudly hosted the National All Girls Sport and Cultural Festival**, a four-day event that provided a platform for all **22 schools from across the country** to showcase their talents, share experiences, and forge bonds that we hope will last beyond that moment.

Additionally, our school participated in the annual **PPP Derby Day at Pretoria Girls High**, where our netball, hockey, tennis, squash, chess, debating, and public speaking teams displayed their competitive spirit and exceptional skills.

Overall, our sports programme was particularly robust this year. Our **athletics team** competed in **eight meetings**, showcasing their talent and dedication at events such as the **Athletics Training Camp and the Provincial Secondary School Championships**.

In **cross country**, our athletes maintained rigorous training, competing in **six leagues**, achieving personal bests, even though we did not have representatives at the SA Cross Country Championship.

Hockey was another area of strength, with a busy season filled with league matches. Our teams participated in the U14 hockey festival and performed impressively at the **Best of the West** tournament,

with **13 learners representing North West across various age groups**.

The **Majorettes** achieved remarkable success at the Provincial Championships, emerging as the **North West Champion of Champions**. They also excelled at the National Championships held in Cape Town during the September/October break, solidifying their status as **one of the elite teams in the country**.

Netball remained a significant focus, with our teams participating in several tournaments, including the **Best of the West Festival** and various **Fast-5 tournaments**. **Seven of our players were selected for North West Netball teams**, a testament to the strength of our programme.

In **squash**, our girls excelled in the mixed squash league, with the Girls High Pink Ladies and Girls High Navy teams achieving commendable overall rankings.

Swimming also saw strong performances, with our team competing in five **Johannesburg league galas and excelling at the North West Schools Gala**, whilst individual swimmers represented us at the Botswana National Championships.

Please understand that my omission of individual highlights is intentional. After all, this afternoon is dedicated to acknowledging and celebrating those exceptional athletes, and we will applaud their achievements wholeheartedly when they take the stage.

On the **cultural front**, we take immense pride in the remarkable achievements of our learners, who demonstrated excellence across various disciplines. The **choir and drama** teams flourished, with the drama girls achieving an impressive **ninth place** nationally at the Festival of Excellence in Dramatic Arts. Additionally, our school distinguished itself as the institution with the most entrants - **217 in total** - at this year's **Allegretto Eisteddfod**, where our **marimba** teams also received accolades, and all participants collectively earned an impressive **303 diplomas**. Furthermore, two senior debating teams showcased their skills at the **North West Schools Debating Tournament**.

Additionally, this year, **35 girls and four educators**

participated in a ten-day European Enrichment Tour to Budapest, Venice, Florence, and Rome. This experience not only broadened their horizons but also deepened their understanding of the diverse cultures that shape our global community, which I hope has served to enrich their sense of belonging to a larger, interconnected world.

The co-curricular programme for 2024 highlights the incredible dedication, talent, and spirit of our learners. Their achievements in sports, arts, and cultural events reflect the holistic development that we strive to promote at The High School for Girls, Potchefstroom. As we celebrate these successes, it is important to recognize that our **commitment to enhancing the educational experience extends beyond extracurricular activities.**

Over and above the pillars of academics, sport and culture, **Service remains a significant component of our school.** This year, our girls continued to firmly uphold our traditions of the blanket competition, blood donation drives and charity collections, as well as Mandela Week and a variety of outreach undertakings through Interact.

I think it is significant to share with you today that our Grade 8 to 12 homeroom classes amassed a staggering total of R51 543, 11, which will be used to purchase items for various charities. These items will be donated during our annual Children's Day, which takes place in November. And our girls knitted sufficient strips to assemble a total of 193 blankets!

Over the past five years, we have also embarked upon significant capital projects that have greatly improved our school and hostels. The crown jewels of 2024 are the completion of the **Melanie Scholtz Dream Centre** and the installation of solar power across our campus. These projects not only symbolise our school's bright future but also underscore our commitment to sustainability and innovation.

The Dream Centre embodies our vision for the future of education, with its acronym standing for **Decisions, Responsibilities, Education, Achievement, and Motivation** - core values that are essential in the journey of learning and personal growth. Meanwhile, our **solar installation stands** as a testament to our dedication to progress. I have always believed that The High School for Girls, Potchefstroom is a **lighthouse**, and ultimately, these two initiatives affirm that we are indeed a beacon of light - both literally and figuratively – enhancing our girls' journey towards brighter futures.

The evening left all in awe at the wonderfully talented and supportive Grade 8s - a promise of our school going from strength to strength.

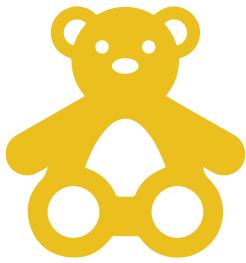

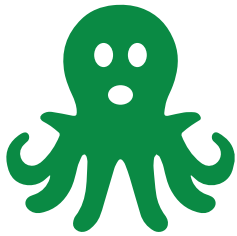

A key moment for me is definitely ‘Derby Week’

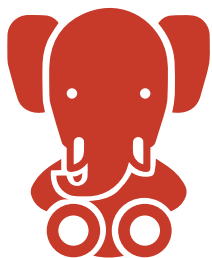

Impressively, **all the gold winners at the regionals were from the High School for Girls**. The school also claimed the majority of category winner awards, with only two going to other schools. The adjudicators praised the girls for their excellent research, problem-solving, and dedication throughout the competition. **Notably, five of the seven students representing the Dr Kenneth Kaunda District at the International Science Fair came from the High School for Girls.**

The selected participants included **myself, Rievkah Boardman, Laura Andrade de Ponte Shelimiah Chikwaikwai, and Sinovuyo Ndlala**, although Sinovuyo was unable to attend due to hospitalization. **We are proud of Shelemiah Chikwaikwai obtaining a bronze medal, Rievkah Boardman a silver medal, and Laura Andrade de Ponte a gold medal. I obtained a gold medal and a special award. I received a laptop, monitor, laptop bag and optical mouse from FFS Refiners.**

The atmosphere at the Emperors Palace Convention Centre was **electric**. Every sight, sound, and experience felt magnified as the participants dived into the excitement of the event. The first day involved participants **settling in and adjusting** to the lively convention centre. This led to me

viewing life in a different and determined manner as I had felt the weight taken off my shoulders. I sought support, embraced my emotions and let go. No words could describe the joyful feeling I experienced in feeling the peace engulf me.

Grief is a transformative experience that shaped me in various ways. While my initial response was guided by survival, over time, I learned that change is required and essential for growth. As Maya Angelou aptly said, *"I did then what I knew how to do. Now that I know better, I do better."* This sentiment encapsulates the evolution that accompanies the journey of grief.

CASSANDRA MAKOKA

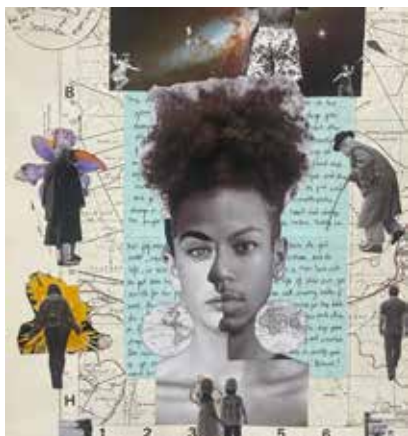
